### African Cemetery hosts human trafficking exhibit

The Key West African Cemetery at Higgs Beach has long honored the 294 Africans who died in Key West in 1860 after the U.S. military intercepted the illegal slave ships that were taking 1,492 Africans to a life of slavery in the sugar plantations of Cuba.

Two of four abandoned wooden doors that have been transformed into messages representing "doors to freedom" by local artists, educators and students are at the African refugee cemetery exhibit.

Upon finding the slave ships at sea, and noting the deplorable conditions on board, the U.S. military brought the ships to Key West, where the island's residents provided food, shelter, clothing and medical care until the Africans were loaded onto different boats and taken back to Africa. Despite the best of intentions,





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Human Trafficking" by artist Kay Chernush is designed to shed light on modern-day slavery and human trafficking. It is now on display at the African Cemetery and will be there through Feb. 28 as one of the three prongs of Key West resident Erika Biddle's

"Blind Spots" exhibit. created a series of display easels at the cemetery, each of which features a piece of art as well as a heart wrenching story of human trafficking and modern-day slavery from various countries.

"I was 10 when she sold me. The men, they think if they have sex with a virgin girl, they get good luck. They "Bought & Sold: Voices of will get sons. They will get

money, get very rich. They pay very much money for sex with virgin girl, young virgin girl. So after first time, you get stitched up...two, three, four times. I was four times virgin."

The quotation is from a Cambodian girl who was trafficked within Cambodia, Artist Kay Chernush has according to Chernush's piece. Other easels display words as powerful as the artistic images alongside them. In addition to the month-long display of Chernush's work at the African Cemetery at Higgs Beach, an opening premier of Biddle's "Blind Spots - Modern Day Slavery Exposed" will begin with a reception at 6 p.m. Thursday at The Studios of Key West, 533 Eaton St.

"This multifaceted, threepart exhibit, developed by Biddle to encourage action against human trafficking and child exploitation, includes images by renowned photographer U. Roberto (Robin) Romano, and art installations by local artists Cricket Desmarais and Gretchen Mills, along with participation by local students and the artistic display by Chernush."

In recent years, reports that Monroe County children have been victims of sex trafficking targeted by groups from the mainland shocked our community.

"This strikes home as much as any other violent act that we see in the world today," said Heidi Golightly, of the Keys to be the Change organization, which, along with the Florida Keys Council of the Arts, is sponsoring the event. "'Blind Spots' offers not only awareness, but inspiration for concrete actions that

As the mission of Keys to Be The Change is to empower young people to realize their full potential while taking action to create positive change in the world, we are eager to support this project in hopes that our community will band together to put an end to human trafficking

once and for all." The schedule for "Blind

Spots" is as follows: At 7 p.m. Saturday, The Studios will host a film screening of "Children of Bal Ashram," documenting the work of Nobel Peace Prize recipient Kailash Satyarthi, who liberated and rehabilitated more than 87,000 children from child labor, slavery

and trafficking. A question-and-answer session with director Len Morris, and discussion about what actions can be taken to protect the innocent will follow. In addition, an outdoor exhibit about Human Trafficking will be on view for the month of February. presented by ArtWorks For Freedom, entitled 'Bought and Sold," by Kay Chernush, sponsored by Keys To Be The Change at the African Cemetery, on Higgs Beach.

"The location was selected to honor the memories and tragedy of those unfortunate individuals who were abducted from their home in Africa to be sold as 'commercial goods' so many years ago. This injustice and transgression is not something that merely happened in the past. Human Trafficking, or modern slavery, still continues to this day," Biddle said.

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
